

# New Equipment Leads a Paradigm Shift

### A Generational Gift

soon to be launched clinical trial will be the first in the world that aims to substantially improve quality of life for ovarian cancer patients. By combining multiple test methods together, patients will gain access to more accurate, personalized genomic information, allowing them to make informed choices about their own care.

The trial is made possible by a donor-funded NextSeq 550 Next Generation Sequencer System (Sequencer), the first in Saskatchewan. The Sequencer is leading-edge technology for genetic DNA testing of tumors and blood.

Thanks to a gift made in honour of Donald E. Kramer, the Sequencer was purchased to support work being done by Dr. Laura Hopkins, Provincial Lead for Gynecologic Oncology at the College of Medicine and the Saskatchewan Cancer Agency.

A donation in honour of Donald E. Kramer was made on behalf of his children, grand-children and great grandchildren to purchase the NextSeq 550 Next Generation Sequencer System.

Dr. Hopkins is leading a study that will use the Sequencer to test ovarian cancer patients' tumours for genetic mutations. This personalized information predicts how individual patients will respond to drug treatments, resulting in less side effects and increased quality of life.

"We are leading a paradigm shift in ovarian cancer care with this trial," she said.

"We're working with gynecologic researchers in Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Alberta, and British Columbia to identify how to use the genomic sequencing data from this project to best benefit cancer patients," said Dr. Hopkins.

While the Sequencer was purchased to support work being done in ovarian cancer care, the most fatal gynecologic cancer, it is already being used to address prostate cancer. Dr. Hopkins says the Sequencer will also be useful in addressing pancreatic and breast cancer, as well as others.

Thank you to the Kramer family's children, grandchildren and great grandchildren for their vision to invest in the future of cancer care.

# Research – Where Hope Lives

### Saskatchewan Cancer Agency's Research Department

n May 1990, the Saskatchewan Cancer Agency
(Agency) established a research group through
funding awarded by the Terry Fox Regional Development
Grant from the National Cancer Institute of Canada.

This grant allowed the Agency to recruit four research scientists, with cross appointments in the College of Medicine at the University of Saskatchewan (USask), to set up a dynamic Cancer Research Centre in our province.

Agency research scientists provide state-of-the-art laboratory experiences with a very active training environment for graduate students and Post-Doctoral Fellows. Each scientist holds an appointment in the Division of Oncology, College of Medicine at USask and is also an adjunct member in Biochemistry, Anatomy, Microbiology, Immunology, or Pathology.

Creating an interactive, collaborative research environment is critical to advancing discoveries in the field of cancer research. "There are opportunities for real patient benefits when clinicians and scientists work together in the area of precision medicine; where the right patient gets the right treatment at the right time" said Dr. Deborah Anderson, Director of Research, Saskatchewan Cancer Agency.

The addition of a biobank just over a year ago has enabled the testing of live specimens and enhanced the ability to precisely inform clinical decision-making. Thanks to research, more and more treatments are tailored to the patient, providing the best outcome possible.

Thanks to your generosity, we have been able to provide more than \$460,000 to fund two clinical trials and leading-edge equipment for the lab.

# Pink is the Colour, Football is the Game



Our Saskatchewan Roughriders are more than a professional football team. They are ambassadors for our

community and our province. For over a decade, the Cameco Riders Touchdown for Dreams program, a partnership between the Saskatchewan Roughriders and Cameco, has granted more than 70 Dreams for women facing a life-threatening cancer diagnosis.

"It's just so humbling to see these ladies and how they approach life and their diagnosis," said Kevin Clive, who brought Cameco on board to support the program in its early years through his position as Senior Sales and Partner Relations Executive with the Club.

"Rider fans play a critical role in this program, and they have been incredibly supportive. Rider Nation really funds the Dreams through the sale of pink items at the special "Pink Game" each October. We have fans that make sure they always attend the Touchdown for Dreams game because they want to support and buy the pink item." he said.

Dream recipients are invited to the Pink Game and are often joined at a special dinner by Rider ambassadors the night before. Beyond making Dreams come true, Rider players, coaches and staff give recipients the star treatment which over the years has included being taken down to field level for the highly-anticipated 'Bring 'Em Out' entrance, and being involved in the coin toss.

Clive says the program means a lot to the team, with all game day staff participating and the players wearing pink spats, gloves, or other pink items during the Pink Game. He attributes the longevity of the program to the commitment of both Roughrider President and CEO Craig Reynolds and Cameco CEO Tim Gitzel.

"Our partnership with Cameco has been critical to the success of this program," he said. "It means a lot to so many people."



### **CFL Fans Tackle Cancer**

ootball fans flocked to Regina for the 109<sup>th</sup> Grey Cup, and although the Toronto Argonauts took home the Cup, the real champions were local cancer patients.

Established in 2005, CFL Fans Fight Cancer started as a result of Ron Lancaster's cancer diagnosis. In cities hosting the Grey Cup, a committee of local volunteers host fundraising events for local cancer charities.

Led by the folks at Piffle Podcast in 2022, CFL Fans Fight Cancer raised a whopping \$24,346 to support cancer patients at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre in Regina!



hen the Regina Pats Hockey Club approached Kip Simon, owner of 22Fresh, to get involved in their 14th Annual Cancer Awareness Game, he agreed immediately. Over the last 13 years, the Pats focused on breast cancer awareness, but broadened the scope this year to include everyone impacted by the disease. For Kip, this game was an opportunity to support his wife Kelly, who had been diagnosed with breast cancer this year.

The Pats wore themed jerseys designed by 22Fresh, which were auctioned off online, and limited edition merchandise was available to purchase. Hockey fans bid high and all the merchandise sold out, resulting in an astonishing \$22,000 raised to support Saskatchewan cancer patients, just like Kelly.

# Fueling Cancer Care, One Litre at a Time

### Sherwood Co-op and the Co-op Refinery Complex

ore than \$250,000 has been donated to the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan over the past four years, courtesy of "Fuel Good Day", a partnership between Sherwood Co-op and the Co-op Refinery Complex.

"Giving back to our community is paramount for Sherwood Co-op and the Co-op Refinery Complex. We are very proud of our donations to the Cancer Foundation because we know how much good the money does for people in our community," said Troy Verboom, CEO of Sherwood Co-op.

Since 2019, Sherwood Co-op designates one day a year as "Fuel Good Day". On this day, 20 cents from every litre of fuel sold at a Sherwood Co-op gas station is donated by Sherwood Co-op and the Co-op Refinery Complex to support cancer patients.

"We have people who show up on fumes because they know that every single litre that they can put into their vehicle is an extra 20 cents for the Cancer Foundation," said Megan Dunn, Community Engagement Manager.

Funds raised through Fuel Good Day have supported various initiatives, including:

- the purchase of a \$1.5 million 4D CT simulator, which was installed in the Allan Blair Cancer Centre in 2019,
- the renewal of the Regina Cancer Patient Lodge in 2023, and
- new internal radiation equipment to strengthen the Allan Blair Cancer Centre's Provincial Prostate HDR Brachytherapy program.

When Greg & Leone Ottenbreit's son Brayden was diagnosed with a rare form of brain cancer at the age of three, they were heart-broken. Why Brayden? They immediately started the Brayden Ottenbreit Close Cuts for Cancer, a head-shaving fundraiser in Yorkton. Sadly, Brayden passed away at five years of age. Determined to keep his memory alive they decided not to be 'bitter', but to be 'better', and continued the head shave. 25 years later, Brayden Ottenbreit Close Cuts for Cancer has raised more than \$1 million for cancer research and local cancer initiatives in Saskatchewan....making their community 'better'.

## A Legacy Gift to the HDR Brachytherapy Campaign

acob and Jessie Braun built their home and long life together in Swift Current.

When Jessie developed a lump on her breast, she delayed getting a diagnosis for fear that it may be cancer. As the lump worsened, she finally stirred enough courage to see the doctor. Unfortunately by then, her breast cancer had progressed to stage 4.

Jessie received chemotherapy treatments at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre and a full mastectomy, and Jacob was right there with her. "The Allan Blair Cancer Centre was very important as it gave Jessie such good treatment and extended her time with me" said Jacob.

Unfortunately, Jessie's cancer metastasized and Jacob lost the love of his life on June 14, 2015.

Jacob updated their Will to honour the incredible care Jessie received at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre by leaving their entire estate to help other patients on their cancer journey. Their legacy gift came at a crucial moment to support the High Dose Rate (HDR) Brachytherapy campaign to enhance targeted internal radiation for patients being treated at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre.

## Keeping Mom's Memory, Every Month



eanne Rein's mom, Caroline Hamm, was diagnosed with breast cancer in the fall of 2020. The Saskatoon Cancer Centre team made an impression with their compassion and support to Caroline and her family during treatments. Unfortunately, her cancer was very aggressive and she passed away on April 29, 2021.

After she passed, her family directed memorial gifts to the Foundation, and Leanne signed up for the Monthly Giving Program.

Leanne likes knowing that her monthly donations may help purchase new equipment or make patient stays more comfortable. She knows that Saskatchewan cancer patients will benefit and her mother's memory will live on.

# SaskTel's Culture of Philanthropy

S askTel has built a culture of giving back to the people and communities of Saskatchewan. Tim Jones, SaskTel Manager of Internal Communications, describes TelCare as one way that employees put their generosity into action.

"SaskTel TelCare was started in 1950 as a way for SaskTel employees to engage with their communities. Approximately 20% of employees donate regularly to the TelCare fund through payroll deductions, and SaskTel contributes \$0.50 for every employee dollar donated. Employees nominate charities each year and vote on where to invest their donations," Tim explained.

Since 1987, TelCare members have recognized the importance of supporting cancer care in Saskatchewan. Their annual donations have contributed nearly \$350,000 to the Allan Blair Cancer Centre in Regina.

With so many charities doing important work in our province, Tim says, "There's always at least one nomination for the Cancer Centre. It's a cause close to many people's hearts. Everyone is affected by cancer in some way."

SaskTel helps employees learn the joy of generosity and it becomes a habit. When employees retire from SaskTel, many continue to make meaningful contributions to their communities through volunteerism with the SaskTel Pioneers.

The Pioneers are a network of over 4,000 current and former SaskTel employees from twelve clubs across Saskatchewan, including the Harry AD Allen Life Members in Regina.

For years, Harry AD Allen Life Members have worked hard at their fundraising to supply head scarves, turbans and lap quilts all made personally by hand and free for cancer patients. Since 2007, the Harry AD Allen Life Members have donated \$13,550 paying tribute to their lost members through memorial donations and with more recent donations supporting the Regina Cancer Patient Lodge and the Breast Screening Bus.

# HDR Brachytherapy: Targeted Internal Radiation Therapy

hanks to you, more than \$1.25 million dollars has been donated since October 2021 to upgrade and replace the high dose rate (HDR)

Brachytherapy equipment for both the Saskatoon Cancer Centre (SCC) and the Allan Blair Cancer Centre (ABCC) in Regina. This is a very precise and targeted form of internal radiation, used most often for prostate, cervical, and endometrial cancers.

The Provincial Prostate Brachytherapy program at ABCC began using its new equipment in May 2023! The suite itself is still undergoing a significant renovation to set the stage for the future of Brachytherapy programming.

The Provincial Gynecology Brachytherapy equipment for SCC has been ordered, including a complete set of treatment accessories.

Timelines are in place to be operational this fall.
