

BREAST CANCER FACT SHEET

Breast Cancer in Saskatchewan

- It is estimated in 2024 that 780 Saskatchewan women were diagnosed with breast cancer.
- It is estimated in 2024 that 180 Saskatchewan women died from breast cancer.
- Breast cancer is the number one diagnosed form of cancer in women.
- Breast cancer accounts for 25% of all new cancer cases in women.

Breast Cancer in Canada

- It is estimated that 38% of breast cancer cases will be diagnosed in females aged 30 to 59 years.
- One in eight Canadian women will develop breast cancer during their lifetime and one in 36 will die from it.
- The 5-year net survival rate for breast cancer is 89%.

Risk Factors

- Age: The risk of developing breast cancer increases as a woman ages. Breast cancer mostly occurs in women between 50 and 69 years of age.
- Family History: Having one first-degree relative (mother, sister, daughter) with breast cancer almost doubles a woman's risk. Approximately 5-10% of breast cancer cases are caused by an inherited gene mutation.
- **Early Menstruation**: Women who experience their period at age 11 or younger are more likely to develop breast cancer.
- Women who enter menopause after age 55 are also more likely to develop breast cancer.
- Body weight: Obesity increases the risk for breast cancer in post-menopausal women.

Screening in Saskatchewan

- In 1990, the Saskatchewan Cancer Agency launched the Screening Program for Breast Cancer.
- Women 47 years and older should have regular screening mammograms. Once a woman turns
 47, she will receive an invitation letter every two years to have a mammogram completed by the
 Agency.
- Eligibility will be expanded to include women aged 45 and older at the end of June 2025.
- Women with a <u>family history of breast cancer or a breast density greater than 75% should be screened annually.</u>
- You do not need a referral to have a screening mammogram. Simply call the Agency's Breast Screening Program toll free at 1-855-584-8228 to schedule.
- Each year, the Cancer Agency provides <u>approximately 37,000 screening mammograms</u> through the Screening Program for Breast Cancer.
