Thanks to donor support, this year marked the successful completion of our Breast Screening Campaign. Together, we surpassed our \$5 million goal, funding two custom-built mobile screening trailers and two additional digital mammography machines. As breast screening eligibility expands to include women beginning at age 40, these investments will ensure more people have access to early detection services, regardless of where they live.

While technology and equipment remain essential to advancing cancer care, your support reaches far beyond what can be seen inside a treatment room.

Each year, donor funding provides practical assistance and comfort to patients and families, ensuring no one faces cancer alone. From transportation and accommodation assistance to nutrition programs, exercise and wellness initiatives, and emergency patient support, your donations help ease the burden of cancer.

As I look back on the past year, I am always amazed by the work that has been done. Our teams in prevention, early detection, treatment, and research are hard at work each day advancing key initiatives that will improve the patient and family experience every time someone new comes through our doors.

The Saskatchewan Cancer Agency is proud of the progress we have made in the last year to improve care, quality, and service to patients and clients across the province.

Key accomplishments include:

- Our new lung screening program, LungCheck, launched in two communities in Saskatchewan: La Ronge and Swift Current at the Associated Family Physicians Clinic.
- Foundational work is underway to transition our CervixCheck screening program to include human papillomavirus testing in 2027.
- Targeted support for northern Indigenous communities occurred in 2025-2026, including two pilot projects for multiple myeloma and gastrointestinal cancer, to support this population.
- We continue to expand the Gynecological High-Dose-Rate Interstitial Brachytherapy program for women with advanced gynecological cancers.

We are tremendously grateful for your generosity and our partnership with the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan to identify areas of greatest need. Each donation, either as a one-time gift, monthly contribution, or legacy gift in memory of a loved one, contributes to exceptional cancer care for the people of Saskatchewan.

Five Fewer Days of Cancer

In the summer of 2019, time stood still for Kerrie Gavin. Her diagnosis: triple-negative breast cancer.

Kerrie's time became measured in treatments and doctors' appointments. Six months of chemotherapy followed by a double mastectomy. When she finally exhaled, tests showed the cancer hadn't responded to chemotherapy. The clock reset, and Kerrie settled in for eight more months of chemotherapy.

Just as life began to feel normal again, the cancer returned – this time in her chest wall.

More surgery. More recovery. More time stolen by cancer.

When radiation began, Kerrie was told to expect 30 treatments. Then research changed her plan.

A new medication meant she would only need 25 treatments instead of 30. Five fewer trips to the cancer centre. Five fewer exhausting days. Five fewer moments where life revolved around cancer.

That's what research looks like in real life. It gives time back.

That fall, a simple email to friends and family resulted in thousands raised for the C95 Radio Marathon for Breast Cancer Research. By 2025,

Kerrie's events were raising \$55,000 a year.

Her reason is simple:
"You can't cure what you don't fund."

Since her diagnosis, two daughters have married, she's become a grandmother, her son has gotten engaged, and she has raised \$240,000 for breast cancer research.

Because when cancer robs you of time, research helps reclaim it.

Hope in Motion

Thomas Morris was born in Saskatoon in 1957. From an early age, he was always in motion – speedskating, swimming, playing football, and above all, cross-country running. Movement was how Tom experienced the world.

Through decades of study, research, and service, he continued running marathons around the globe. He studied physical education, physiology, and toxicology at the University of Saskatchewan, and built a 25-year career with Health Canada, finishing up his career as an assessment officer in the Clinical Trials Group. Tom understood the power of research to improve lives – a belief that took on new meaning when colon cancer became part of his own journey.

In 2021, as his illness progressed, Tom returned to Saskatoon to be close to his family. Though cancer narrowed his world, it never defined him. Surrounded by his University of Saskatchewan memorabilia, favourite running routes, and prized stereo system, Tom faced his final months with the same determination that guided his life.

Tom passed away on June 23, 2022, but he left more than memories. In gratitude for the care he received at the Saskatoon Cancer Centre, he chose to bequeath his pension and estate of \$787,598 to support cancer research in Saskatchewan.

His brother, David Morris shared, “Our family is immensely proud of Tom’s legacy.”

Tom’s story reminds us to keep moving forward, to live fully while we can, and to leave the world better than we found it.

A Daughter's Drive

A year after high school, Donny Kotylak started long hauling and later founded Don Ko Trucking to serve local farmers. His daughter, Leanne, grew up in that world – riding in trucks, helping with invoicing, and even dressing up as him for career day.

When Leanne was in Grade 11, her dad got sick: he was diagnosed with colon cancer and stage 4 liver cancer.

Treatment meant chemotherapy every second Friday in Regina. Sometimes Leanne would drive him from their home in Candiak, Saskatchewan. On one of those drives, he said, “I wish I would have worked more.” It wasn’t regret – it was love.

Donny loved the farmers he served and the work he did. Throughout his career, he drove two

million miles – a proud accomplishment that he often mentioned.

Leanne was his caregiver while finishing high school and starting university during COVID-19. In April 2021, the same month as his birthday, her dad passed.

Determined to carry on what he built, Leanne took over the business while completing an agribusiness diploma. To transform April from a month of grief into one of purpose, she donates a portion of every load to the Patient Care and Comfort Fund.

Her dad received excellent treatment, but it was the community support that made the difference. Leanne knows not every family has that. Through Don Ko Trucking, she’s making sure they do.

The Beat Goes On

Nearly 30 years ago, the students of Thom Collegiate rallied around one of their own.

In 1997, Grade 9 student Christian Alphonso was diagnosed with a rare form of leukemia and needed specialized treatment out of province. Determined to help, his best friend, Daniel Gardiner, and classmates organized a fundraiser to support Christian and his family's journey. Though he sadly passed away, the compassion shown during that time sparked students' commitment to beat cancer – a fight that continues today.

Each spring, Thom's Beat Cancer Week brings together students, staff, families, and the wider community for a powerful, week-long fundraiser. Pancake breakfasts, hot dog lunches, Jail & Bail, movie days, and countless student-led initiatives transform the school into a hub of purpose and action.

Each year, new students carry this torch forward. While they never met Christian, his story continues to unite this community. Over the years, Thom students and staff have raised more than \$278,000 in support of cancer care at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre.

Still today, Daniel, alongside his wife, Laurel, and their family, honours Christian's memory by matching the students' fundraising efforts. Their commitment is shaped by both loss and hope. They honour the memories of Daniel's father, Rod, and Laurel's mother, Carla, who both lost their lives to cancer, while celebrating their sister-in-law, Shannon, who recently overcame her diagnosis.

Thom's Beat Cancer Week remains a living tribute – proving that friendship, generosity, and the determination to beat cancer can echo across many generations.

Strength Through Every Chapter

At 17, with a Grade 10 education and a strong sense of adventure, Hilliard “Hill” Radford joined the Royal Canadian Navy, serving proudly from 1956 to 1961.

While stationed at HMCS Shearwater, a borrowed cashmere topcoat changed the course of his life. On a night out with friends, Hill caught Dawn’s eye – a sharp-dressed sailor she immediately found handsome. That chance meeting led to a lifelong partnership; they will celebrate 66 years together this year.

Hill and Dawn moved to Saskatchewan in 1969, where they built both their careers and their lives together. Dawn worked with the Regina Chamber of Commerce in the 1970s and 1980s, while Hill established himself in finance. In 1984, he became manager of City Savings & Trust, growing the organization from \$21 million to \$89 million before launching his own business in 1989.

Years later, while celebrating their 55th anniversary on a Caribbean cruise, Hill noticed blood in his urine. Doctors discovered tumours and removed them, but 14 months later, the symptoms returned. On October 30, 2017, Hill underwent radical surgery to remove the cancer. Fortunately, no chemotherapy or radiation was required.

Today, Hill and Dawn give back to the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan to ensure others receive the care they need close to home. Their message to cancer patients is simple:

“We wish you fair winds and calm seas.”

Service That Extends Beyond the Siren

For more than a century, the International Association of Fire Fighters Local 80 has represented the members of the Saskatoon Fire Department – firefighters who stand ready, day and night, to protect their community. But their commitment doesn't end when the sirens go quiet.

What began simply with firefighters wearing pink shirts during Breast Cancer Awareness Month has grown into a powerful movement of awareness and action for breast cancer research.

Every year, a fire engine gets wrapped in pink. As Engine 12 travels through Saskatoon's streets, it turns heads, starts conversations, and inspires generosity. Fundraisers like comedy nights and car washes have helped raise more than \$87,000 in support of the C95 Radio Marathon for Breast Cancer Research.

Their commitment is deeply personal. Cancer is the leading cause of occupational death among firefighters. The risk is real, and that reality fuels their passion.

Beyond fundraising, they are prioritizing cancer prevention and early detection within their own ranks. A nurse practitioner now works with the association, helping

firefighters establish health baselines and monitor for early signs of cancer.

Under the leadership of charities chair Jayden Poirier, a culture of giving back defines the union. Rookies quickly learn that service extends beyond emergency response.

Together, Saskatoon firefighters continue raising awareness, advancing research, and proving that courage takes many forms.

When Stan Garchinski joined the Prairie Carriage Driving Club 14 years ago, he stepped into more than an equine community – he stepped into a legacy.

Since 2011, when longtime member Pearl Brown was diagnosed with cancer, the club has been raising funds for the Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan. What started as support for one of their own has grown into the annual Trek for Cancer.

Each fall, riders and carriage drivers gather for a scenic trail trek before welcoming the wider community to join. With a barbecue, wagon rides, live local music, and opportunities to donate, the event has grown into a meaningful community fundraiser.

Five years ago, the event moved to a larger venue to accommodate growing participation.

That commitment was reinforced on March 11, 2024, when Bill Humeny, a founding member of the driving club, passed away from cancer. His loss fuels their determination to continue the Pearl Brown/Bill Humeny Memorial Trek for Cancer.

“We keep doing this because we know it supports local cancer care,” Stan says. “We want to help make sure cancer patients’ suffering is lessened.”

What began as support for Pearl, and strengthened in memory of Bill, has become a powerful tradition: a community riding and driving together to ensure no one faces cancer alone.

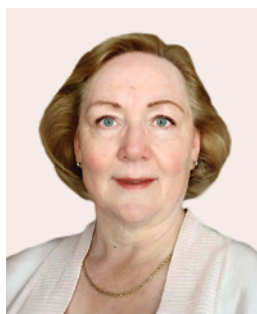

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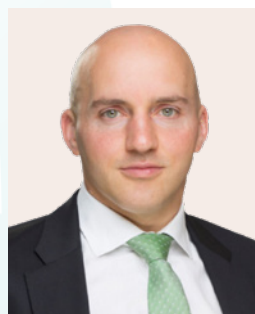

Campaign Updates

Saskatchewan Breast Screening Campaign Completion

Thanks to the incredible generosity of YOU – our donors – more than \$5 million has been invested into breast screening in Saskatchewan. With two mobile mammography vehicles now in operation, and two new digital mammography machines in the permanent centres, screening capacity can meet the growing demand as the age of eligibility is lowered to 40 as of July 1, 2026.



The final piece of the Saskatchewan Breast Screening Campaign is a new SUV purchased by MNP. This vehicle will help transport staff and supplies to and from the mobile breast screening trailer.

We're so grateful to all our donors and volunteers across Saskatchewan who stepped up to support this incredible project. Together, we're ensuring that Saskatchewan women have access to breast screening close to home. Thank you!

Regina Cancer Patient Lodge Renewal Campaign Completion

After years of planning and hard work, the Regina Cancer Patient Lodge renewal project is now complete! Your donations have created a safer, more comfortable, and more welcoming home away from home for patients and their families.

All 18 guest rooms have been fully upgraded with new beds, bedding, furniture, vinyl flooring, blinds, lighting, and a new TV. Each room now includes an updated private washroom with either a walk-in shower or bathtub, improving accessibility and safety. One room has been designed to be fully wheelchair accessible. The addition of several queen beds has also increased capacity, allowing the lodge to welcome up to 32 guests and enabling many patients to keep their loved ones close during treatment.

Major improvements throughout the building will ensure it lasts long into the future, including new triple-pane windows, updated heating, a refreshed games room, and earlier upgrades to the roof, cooling systems, and elevator. The main floor has also been transformed with new flooring and lighting, an inviting reception area, redesigned laundry facilities, upgraded TV lounges, and refreshed dining and kitchen spaces.

This remarkable transformation was made possible by the generosity of donors across Saskatchewan. Thank you for helping ensure that cancer patients and their families have a comfortable place to stay, connect, and focus on what matters most – healing.

Bridging the Distance: Saskatoon Cancer Patient Lodge



Now we turn our focus to the Saskatoon Cancer Patient Lodge. For more than forty years, the little old house on College Drive quietly changed lives. But due to structural limitations, safety concerns, and capacity challenges, that home could no longer meet the needs of the people who depend on it.

In 2020, patients were moved into temporary accommodations with fewer rooms, less space, and reduced access to the supportive environment that made the cancer patient lodge so meaningful.

A permanent, purpose-built patient lodge is no longer a future vision. It is an urgent necessity.

The new Saskatoon Cancer Patient Lodge is a \$25 million project. The Cancer Foundation of Saskatchewan has committed to raising \$12 million, with the remaining funds supported by the Government of Saskatchewan.
